Clapton have announced a new managerial trio of Halil Hassan, Glen Kendall and Paul Gissing ahead of the 2019/20 season.

The management team have been appointed following the Tons 7-1 victory over Sporting Bengal United on the final day of the Essex Senior League.

They will take over the reins from Jonny Fowell who has moved onto pastures new by joining fellow ESL side St Margaretsbury.

Hassan and Gissing have worked together at Brimsdown FC, while Kendall was in charge at Leyton Athletic until midway through last season.

"We wanted to come to Clapton as we see it as an opportunity to elevate the club as we see big potential in Clapton as having their own ground," Hassan said.

"We were at Brimsdown in the Spartan South Midlands League for the last two and half years.

"Paul and I have been working together at Brimsdown, so we know each other well."

One of the managerial trio Hassan says he is exciting to be back at the club after spending some time at The Old Spotted Dog during his playing career.

"The most exciting thing about managing Clapton is that it was a team I played for when I was 20, quite a few years ago as I'm going to be 49 now!" he said.

"Hopefully we can get as high in the league as possible but we'll give it all we've got."

The Tons are already preparing for next season and the new management has worked on putting together a pre-season schedule.

"Pre-season is all in place but we're in the process of contacting clubs and getting games pencilled in," said Hassan. "Once that's finalised we will put that out on social media."

Clapton ended Fowell's reign as boss in style after they thrashed Sporting Bengal United at The Old Spotted Dog on Saturday.

Brian Kyungu, Landre Vigo, Kirk McPherson, Ryan Reed, Giovanni Palmer, Greg Potts and Andy Greenslade all netted for the hosts to help them finish the 2018/19 season in 11th place.

It ended what has been a rollercoaster season for The Tons, with a number of players leaving.

St Bonaventure's bagged two Jr NBA titles after an impressive season for the year seven and eight teams.

Both won their respective leagues before having successful play-off runs, seeing off the likes of Bishop Challoner, Oaks Park School and Chadwell Heath Academy to advance to the final four.

St Bons had made it to the year seven Jr NBA finals in four consecutive years, managing to win two and come third twice, but they made it a third title in their fifth outing.

They sealed a 41-18 victory over St Thomas Moore, who played as Toronto Raptors, in a thrilling contest.

Stephen Onireti, basketball coordinator and coach, said: "Winning one Jr NBA title was nice but winning two in a space of two days was special. Not only that, defending last year's title is more rewarding."
